The course presents an overview of the main artistic trends and philosophical theories that influence the development of the latest world contemporary art. Among them are new materialism, gender studies, object-oriented ontology, science technology studies and other areas that consider the problem of what it means to be a human being in the conditions of technoscience, climate change, late capitalism and other new states that mark the erasure of the differences between science fiction and scientific fact. The course dives into these and other issues, including ethics and subjectivity in contemporary art and philosophy.
